

As he came near and saw the city, he wept over it, saying, "If you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes.

Luke 19:41-42



Before Jesus entered Jerusalem, he paused for a moment to weep. God had sent so many prophets before him. All of them were rejected, stoned or killed. Still, God never gave up. God continued to love his people and to send them messengers who called the people to repentance and a new life.

The Old Testament is a collection of thirty-nine books in which God's steadfast love for Israel and the world is recorded. Since we started using the Narrative Lectionary, every September we start in Genesis and preach our way through the Old Testament. Most every week we could see examples of people who turned away from God, but God still loved them. People rejected and rebelled against God, and yet God still loved them. Nothing that they did stopped God from loving them or altered God's love for them.

The history of the Christian church carries a similar message. The church, at times, has not been very Christian. Instead of peace it brought war. Rather than love it preached racism, sexism, elitism, and nationalism. Through the high points and the low points, though, God's love for God's people never wavered.

Most of us can see the same steadfast love in God's relationship with us. There have been times when we have been extremely close to God and at other times we have wandered and strayed. God's love for us never varied through it all. And God's love never will change.

Such steadfast is a part of God's kingdom and a part of our lives. We're not in for the easy ride; we're in for the long haul. Woody Allen once said that ninety percent of success is just showing up. We are Christians who keep showing up, keep demonstrating our love for others, who keep loving even when there

is no response or when our love is rejected. Love is a constant sign of God's kingdom.

We also acknowledge that we keep messing up and needing forgiveness. We acknowledge that there are times when we grieve our Lord and must remember our baptisms and give thanks that Jesus never gives up on us. Although repentance is a daily activity, this gift is a special focus throughout our liturgical Lenten season.

Jesus entered Jerusalem on a colt—a beast of burden. Jesus knew his kingdom was built on the cross and was experienced in humility, service and perseverance. So, we will continue to pray. In humility, we will continue to serve, and we will be steadfast and persistent even and especially during this time of pandemic. We are the church and it is Jesus Christ who empowers us to never give up when the going gets tough. Because such is the kingdom of God. Thanks be to God.

COLUMBARIUM UPDATE

For the past year, a team has been in the planning stages of building a columbarium on the east side of St. Philip's property. A columbarium is a structure with niches (compartments) to hold the ashes of our loved ones. A contract has been signed with a Minnesota-based company, Eickhof Columbaria, to build the 80-unit structure. We anticipate delivery late this spring. The team is waiting on bids for landscaping and concrete work, and hope to make a final decision on those vendors soon. Presales started in December with three levels of pricing depending on the row of the niche selected. So far, seven niches have been leased.

A table has been set up in the narthex with our proposed rendering, niche sample, and sell sheets. The sell sheet is on page 11 in this newsletter. For those who are interested in leasing a niche, an application folder is also available on the table. Let us know if you prefer to have the folder US mailed to you. 2021 ST. PHILIP'S ANNUAL MEETING CONVENED HYBRID STYLE

On Sunday, February 4 at 10:30 am, St. Philip's conducted its annual business meeting with 70 voting members on Zoom (virtually) and 38 sitting masked and socially distanced in the church's sanctuary. The 108 voting members more than made up the necessary quorum.

A 2021 budget of \$568,038 was unanimously approved. This compares to actual expenditures for 2020, being \$530,507 for General Fund outlays. Capital Fund financial support for 2020 was \$171,162 which enabled all monthly mortgage payments paid on schedule and in full.

David Weisser was elected as St. Philip's new council president, and Stephanie Becken was elected as the new Serving Ministry Coordinator. Council members serving existing terms are Sadie Reiners, Vice President; Katy Lindberg, Secretary; Deborah Dreher, Treasurer; Bruce Arndtson, Communications Marketing and Technology; Abby Schultz, Learning Ministry; Marge Peterson, Worship and Music and Cindy Toppin, Personnel.



STAYING CONNECTED WHILE WE'RE APART

December 2019 I joined the St. Philip's Church family. A few months after joining we all had to adapt to new restrictions



caused by Covid-19. As a new member, I truly appreciate the monumental effort that everyone at St. Philip's has made to keep our faith community together. Even with social distancing and masks, I'm very thankful for warm welcome I received since joining St. Philip's Church.

Looking for a new church home takes time and prayers. I was a member at Prince of Peace in Burnsville for 20+ years. What attracted my family to Prince of Peace was its' youth and outreach programs. I contemplated staying a member of Prince of Peace, but I wanted to join a church community where I live. In my search for a new church home I attended several churches in the Hastings area. My worship experiences helped me make my choice. My number one criteria was a congregation that welcomed everyone.

Because of a pilot's work schedule, I often work weekends. That did not stop me from attending a Sunday service, no matter where I was in the world. Here are my experiences of welcoming worship at churches in Kuwait, USA, and Fiji.

I attended a Catholic Church service in Kuwait. I had a lot of different feelings as I walked into a Christian Church in a Muslin country. The church was packed with parishioners. All the pews were full and many stood along the walls during the evening English service fulfilling the need we all shared to worship God.

In Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, I attended a Baptist Church. The church service was held in a banquet room at the hotel where I was staying. As soon as I walked in, an older lady told me to sit down and join her. She made sure I was welcomed as we worshipped together that morning. When she invited me to sit down, she shared her Bible, and she made me feel welcome in God's house. It's been years since I've been to Harrisburg but, I will never forget her kindness.

I spent Easter in Fuji at a Methodist Church. The church was the right size for a normal Sunday but on Easter it couldn't hold everyone inside. The Easter service was outdoors. There were blue plastic tarps all over the church yard for people to sit on for the evening service. A young Fijian man invited me and my friend to sit down with him on his tarp. The service was all in the Fijian language. It was interesting listening to the Easter message in another language. The congregation sang familiar Easter hymns. As I sat and listened to everyone praising God on High with song, under the starry heavens, I thought what a blessing to be a member of God's family.

This brings be back to where I am now. Why am I at St. Philip's Church? St. Philip's satisfies a shared need to worship, Pastor Geier is inviting, and the congregation is welcoming. I enjoy seeing all the families at St. Philip's. I'm looking forward this year, seeing everyone's mask-less face and connecting with my new St. Philip's friends.

This past summer I retired from Delta Airlines. I started flying when I was 15 years old. A few years after college I was hired by North Central Airlines. Because of mergers I worked for North Central, Republic, Northwest, and finally with Delta Airlines. In my 41+ year career, I've flown to small town airports where I never left the state of Wisconsin and to major metropolitan airports around the world.

I have often been asked, where is my favorite place in the world to fly to? My answer is home. There are many beautiful places in the world, but there is no place like home.

A few favorite places in the world I like to vacation at are Alaska, New Zealand, and the Grand Canyon.

Another question I'm often asked is, if I've ever had anything go wrong during a flight? Yes, I've had a few mechanical problems, passenger issues, and bad weather. Because of my training, mechanical problems have been more or less a non-event.

People caused most of the difficult issues. For example, I had to leave a crew member behind in a foreign country. A flight attendant with an initial diagnosis of having a heart attack. We had the paramedics meet the aircraft to take our crew member to the local hospital. As she was carried off the aircraft, she grabbed my hand and asked, "don't leave me here". It was tough to leaving her behind. The good news was she was able to return back to the USA after a weeklong stay in a hospital.

No, I haven't seen any UFOs.

My wife Lois and I met in college. We have been married for forty one years. We raised three girls who are all on their own living in California, Alaska, and Australia. Our oldest daughter, Lauren and her husband Mark have a 4 month old baby boy named Logan. They live in San Jose, California and both work for Apple. Our middle daughter, Leigh and her husband Andy have a 2 1/2 year old little girl named Marley. They live north of Fairbanks and both work for the Alaska Highway Department. Our youngest daughter Diana is currently living in Sydney, Australia. She is completing her second Master's degree this spring. Lois and I are retired, but work full time at our hobby farm. We had been looking for horse property for a long time before we found our current home. A columbarium is a group of small compartments, or niches, designed to hold the cremated remains (cremains) of deceased loved ones. Each niche is identified by a granite faceplate inscribed with a person's name, birth date, and death date. The Columbarium will be located



east of the church building along Pleasant Drive. Phase One will have 80 niches and includes a peace garden for visiting family and friends. Three additional phases of 80 niches each will take St. Philip's well into the future.

Eligibility

Church members, spouses or domestic partners, and family members, such as father, mother, brother sister, children, and grandchildren are eligible. Other individuals may be approved by the Columbarium Team.

3 Levels of Pricing

The pricing of the niches has been set at three levels, depending on location. All niches include two brass urns and engraving on the columbarium faceplate for up to two person's cremains. Engraving on the two brass urns is not included. Each niche is 12x12x12 inches. Urns other than those furnished may be used in the space allowed.

Niches in Row A and Row B are \$2,500 Niches in Row C and Row D are \$2,200 Niches in Row E are \$1,900
