

²⁶ Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south" to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷ So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury.

Acts 8:26-27



Six times. Six times! In our lesson for April 25, the Bible refers to this Ethiopian court official as a "eunuch" six times. Why does the Bible make such a point to refer to him as a eunuch? Even though he was very wealthy, eunuchs were forbidden by the Law or Moses to become full Jews. They could come

near the Temple, but they couldn't go through the gates. (If you don't believe me look up Deuteronomy 23:1) For over 1,400 years this had been not only a tradition but the law of God.

Could you imagine how well that would go over here at St. Philip's if we would tell people with certain medical conditions that they were welcome here, but they couldn't come into the church building. Or maybe we would allow them in the narthex, but certainly not the sanctuary. Doesn't that sound ridiculous? Can we imagine closing our doors to someone who is searching to know God's love? Yet unfortunately, the Christian church has not always been the warm and embracing community we would like to think it is. We haven't had laws or policies so much as engaged in subtle behaviors to make some people feel unwelcome.

This court official had traveled for many miles to learn about God, but the closest he could get to church was the door. Maybe that's why he bought a scroll, but it wasn't doing him much good because he didn't understand it.

Equally strange is *where* this story occurs. The angel instructs Philip to go to the middle of nowhere in essence. Remember, roads back then could be dangerous and lonely places. But without any questions, Philip heads out and miraculously finds

there a distinguished chariot. Urged by God, Philip runs alongside the chariot and asks a bold question: "Do you understand what you are reading?"

Can you imagine the scene? A lone stranger jogging by your chariot breathlessly asking you such an audacious question. How would the Ethiopian in the comfort of his chauffeured chariot react to this bold even rude question? And yet the Ethiopian responds, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" People of power, and education are not accustomed to asking for help and even less accustomed to taking advice from some random stranger in the middle of nowhere.

Philip could have viewed the Ethiopian eunuch as a freakish foreigner who was wasting his time. But Philip didn't look at people like that. Philip also realized that Jesus' power and love were more powerful than ancient holiness codes. The grace of God manifested in Jesus Christ's crucifixion and resurrection destroyed every distinction that humanity could envision to separate God from the people God loves.

And the Lord who loves all people wants to teach us to view all people as treasures and opportunities to share our faith. God will bring about results when we talk about the peace Jesus has brought to our lives. God works in mysterious ways. But there will be opportunities this week. It might be someone, like the eunuch, not feeling very special, an individual, giving you the chance to tell them how valuable and dearly loved they are by God. You can tell them what Christ did to make them a treasured person. How will God use you this week?

Welcome to spring! It has been a busy month of March for our preschool friends. The weather took a nice turn early which was a plus in Minnesota! The children were busy learning about Llama Llama stories, pizza, Chicka Chicka Boom Boom, and Easter before spring break. Some activities to highlight include PJ day, making their own pizzas, going on a letter hunt, Palm parade, and Easter egg hunt just to name a few! Miss Sarah also included us in the coloring activity to help decorate the narthex for Easter. The children were so excited to see their projects hanging up! As we move forward into April teachers are preparing for parent conferences.

For the months of January and February the preschool was given Covid relief money from the state. Our staff worked very hard to be sure this money was spent on ways to improve the health and safety for our students. One item we would like to mention is the divider wall in the fellowship hall. We as a preschool have been using that to keep our classes from sharing space but allow both classes to have a place for large motor time. If you have been in by that wall in the last five plus years you may know it does not slide well on the track and is falling off in many places. The preschool decided to not only have the wall repaired but also to get the track serviced to prevent further breakage. To do this cost over \$4,000 but we felt it will be very helpful to us in keeping our classes safely separated. We also feel this will be a great benefit to the church as a whole when we get back to having more in-person events.




OPENING THE BIBLE CLASS

On Saturday, April 10 at 9:00 am, third graders and their parents are invited to participate in a



Our high schoolers will go to the Flambeau River Ramble


with Camp Amnicon this summer on July 25-30! This is an all-outdoor program with lots of

I look forward to this experience and am excited to learn and grow while I walk this path with God and you.


AHOY!

STAYING CONNECTED WHILE WE'RE APART

Over the years we have volunteered at many spaghetti dinners, Easter breakfasts, Lenten

LOOKING AT ST. PHILIP'S STEWARDSHIP RESPONSES 20 YEARS AGO

St. Philip's Stewardship Ministry had as an agenda for its March meeting a looking-back at a Stewardship Survey conducted at a worship service on September 16, 2001, which was five days after 9/11. Two hundred adults and 51 youth completed the survey. Two questions from the survey were as follows, with a scoring scale of 5 (strongly agree) to 1 (strongly disagree).

- "Everything I am and have comes from God and belongs to God."
 76% gave this a "5", and 18% a "4", which means 94% scored very high on this.
- "I feel good about the percent of my income I give to my congregation and other causes or efforts."
 24% gave this a "5", and 27% a "4", resulting in 51% satisfied with themselves on this matter.

The survey was interesting to review and ponder as to where we believe people would be on some of the questions in our present time.

The Stewardship team wishes to again express its thanks for the steady flow of financial giving that enables the ministries of St. Philip's to be carried out. God's presence and grace is holding us together.

COLUMBARIUM UPDATE

A team was formed more than a year ago and since then much progress has been made. We have vendors in place for the columbarium, patio, landscaping, benches, and concrete work. Presales started on December 6 for the 80-unit columbarium that was selected. Our goal is to have the columbarium installed sometime this spring or early summer. A dedication will take place when all the work has been completed, probably sometime in September.



Covid-19 public health support for child care, state of Minnesota, costs were covered for expenses which made St. Philip's Preschool a safe and healthy place for children and staff during its Covid school run.

The two classes of the Preschool had to be kept separate, making the use of the Fellowship Hall a large-motor play



space. The folding walls had suffered neglect and did not operate well. Connecting latches needed repair, plus the walls were releasing from the track. The final repair was to clean and add new lubricant to the track for ease of moving the walls.
