

SINCE YOU ASKED...

Why don't we sing patriotic hymns on Sundays closest to Memorial Day, July 4th, and Veterans' Day?

I will try to briefly share my thoughts with you regarding patriotic songs as part of a Christian worship but am open to additional conversations if you so desire.

My theological concerns with patriotic hymns are twofold. First, if Pentecost and the book of Acts taught us anything, it's that the message of Christ is for everyone, everywhere, of every language, tribe, and nation. I believe many patriotic hymns do a disservice to that message. If one of the marks of the Christian church is its inclusiveness, then patriotic songs about America (or any other country) do not seem particularly appropriate in worship.

Second, and more importantly, idolatry becomes a real problem. Patriotic songs often glorify the country or its history, gloss over its faults, and assume that one country receives special perks from God. It seems to me that one can express (national) gratitude to God in more humble ways. We are called to love the nation in which God has planted us.

But there is an American exceptionalism present in so many of these patriotic hymns that fosters a love for a kingdom which rivals the kingdom of God. There is an aspect of prayer for the nation in many of these hymns which I would heartily approve. But I cannot get beyond the bad theology of American exceptionalism and for that reason, I believe they do more harm than good.

I will continue to lift up in our corporate prayers those men and women serving in our armed forces as well as give thanks for those who have died in service to our country.

HONORING ST. PHILIP'S GRADUATES



Deborah Dreher is to be thanked repeatedly for leading St. Philip's through what's become known throughout the region as an event not to miss. The Garage & Plant Sale generates continual goodwill through modestly priced goods that noticeably helps many shoppers meet their essential needs of living, and enjoy the community of friendship which engulfs the day.

Gross proceeds at the time of this writing, totaled \$20,300 which is a full two thousand plus more than any previous sale. Roughly 35 to 40 people worked every day, carrying, repairing, polishing, cleaning, staging, and pricing the thousands of items donated by members. A gracious thank-you is extended to all who donated to the sale.

The Plant Sale led by Geneva Weisser, with David Weisser giving full support, provides the day with that touch of beauty to the grounds as one enters the "Sale" site. Less plants were on display this year but in excess of \$3,000 was generated which is included in the gross proceeds. Enormous thanks to those who divided plants from their gardens, and brought them in great condition and ready for sale.

SOCIAL JUSTICE IN THE LUTHERAN CHURCH

The Worship and Music Ministry Team has been tasked, with the approval of the Council, to explore spirituals sung in worship, and to find out more about their historical significance in the interest of social justice. During our May 31 meeting Raul Jackson asked why "I'll Fly Away" is considered a spiritual. Many of us are familiar with "I'll Fly Away" since we have sung this familiar congregational song many times. However, it is not in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) hymnal, 2006. Hmm? In Eileen Guenther's (2016) publication In Their Own Words: Slave Life and the Power of Spirituals answers were found! Here's a bit of information about the tradition of spirituals in the ELW.

Songs labeled as Spirituals can be found throughout the ELW. Interestingly, "I'll Fly Away" is not in the ELW; however, there are almost 20 titles that are categorized as African American spirituals. Examples include "Go Tell It on the Mountain" (hymn #290), "Were You There" (hymn #353), "This Little Light of Mine" (hymn #677), and "I'm So Glad Jesus Lifted Me" (hymn #859). When Nathan Griner was our second service worship leader, we sang the African American spiritual "I'll Fly Away" often. Did you know it is *not in our ELW*? What message does this popular African American spiritual communicate?

The answer to Raul's question, why is "I'll Fly Away" a Spiritual is found in Guenther's (2016) Chapter 18: Themes of Spirituals: I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me (pages 353-395): "Spirituals are [social] snapshots. They paint many-faceted pictures of an enslaved population in the words of slaves as they describe their housing, food, clothing, resistance, and evangelization" (page 353). In Guenther's discussion of spiritual themes, she categories social issues from Code Songs, Community Life, Death, and Freedom. "I'll Fly Away" is one of several spirituals that focus on themes of "Freedom / Heaven / Salvation / Second Coming / Jordan River" and Resurrection. Guenther's summary statement informs the themes in and the significance of spirituals, "Spirituals are music of protest and music of social justice, and there are more spirituals devoted to these subjects than to any other. . . Many Spirituals focus on God's power to liberate - to give spiritual liberation as well as literal freedom from slavery" (page 366).

A sub-committee of the Worship and Music Ministry Team, led by Darlene Olson, will continue to explore and inform the congregation of songs in which Social Justice themes appear. As Guenther states, "That the Bible forms the material for the songs is no surprise; it was so important to the slaves that they were willing to risk punishment to learn to read, specifically to read the Bible" (page 353). If Raul's question sparks *your* interest about spirituals and/or other hymns in our ELW, Darlene, on behalf of Worship and Music, will be happy to find more answers to your questions. Peace to you all!

My husband Dennis and I have been worshipping at

St. Philip's since July of 2017. We attended with daughter our Jen, son-in-law Jordan, and two grandchildren. Connor and Mackenzie. The members





friendly and welcoming. It made the decision to join the church in May 2019 an easy one. I enjoyed joining in to help with the garage sale that year. I met so many nice people and was hooked on St. Philip's. My story is a little different from those you usually read here but I really wanted to share it.

It was during my drive home the week of the garage sale prep in 2019 that I got a call from my mom. It was unusual since she and I had a somewhat strained relationship at this point. My parents retired in early 2000 and were enjoying the freedom of traveling and living their own life independent of me, my three brothers, and our families. At the time, I had a brother and his family that had been estranged from the rest of us for nearly 20 years even though we all (at that time) lived within miles of one another.

Back to the call. Mom told me that her doctor diagnosed early stages of dementia. In her time of

fear and need, she had reached out to me. She was frightened. I was too, but instead of saying this I told her that we would get through this together and take care of her. Little did I know how this journey would progress and how God would pour blessings upon all of us at such a painful and difficult time.

In October of 2018, I got a message from my estranged sister-in-law. She said that she and my brother were concerned about Mom and asked if we could meet. This was an uncomfortable meeting due to the years of separation and hard feelings. We met at my oldest brother's house along with my two younger brothers to talk about how we could support our parents. We agreed to leave the past behind and move forward together for the good of our parents. Sounded good in theory but was it possible? I lived 180 miles away and they were all local. I agreed to manage finances and health needs. They agreed to be the local support.

Of course, my dad had great needs at this time as well. He was in his early 80's with health challenges but more importantly, he was watching the love of his life being slowly taken away from him. We agreed that Dad was allowed to make the major decisions and we would try to support them. Normally a sweet-natured and happy guy, my dad was very difficult to work with. He lashed out and pushed away our efforts to help. For a time, we had to stand by and do nothing.

There were many painful events through this twoyear period of time that anyone who has been in our situation would attest to. Mom was also in poor physical health and Dad was exhausted. When the Covid quarantine hit, eight weeks of separation was when I lost my mom altogether. When I returned in June, she had forgotten who I was. She didn't know who my dad was. She knew who I was only when she called me on the phone, and there were lots of calls to me and my brothers. She'd forgotten her marriage, where she lived, and wondered where her mother was. She saw people that weren't there. She lashed out and wandered from home, one time resulting in a police search.

We found two wonderful home caregivers who taught me so much and loved me and my family through the worst. I learned to gently enter Mom's world and accept her where she was. This ugly disease turned Mom into a different person. Gone was her tough exterior and blunt comments. We made small talk and laughed together. She came to trust me explicitly and I found a new love and tenderness for her that I'd never quite managed. This was my greatest gift from God.


I visited often and as she declined, I needed to be there even more. We were on waiting lists at the only two local assisted living facilities, but Dad still did not want to give up caring for her.

The day came when we had to move her to a memory care facility. Because of Covid, I wasn't allowed to come inside and get Mom settled. Another miracle came in a phone call from Bell Tower 30 minutes before we left telling me they'd made an exception. My oldest brother followed me and waited in the parking lot until he knew I would be able to manage on my own. I spent the entire day with Mom, a full 8-hours of highs and lows. It was an honor to be with Mom during this time. She thought I was a nurse. She showed me pictures of my family (and me) and told me stories about them. I was at peace with this since it meant she didn't have to be with family to feel safe.

Mom lived only three short months after she moved. There were so many trials during this time but the staff took expert and tender care of her. As with so many others, the bubble of Covid had invaded my family in such painful ways. Even as her medical power of attorney, I wasn't allowed to be in the hospital with her when she broke her femur, had surgery, contracted Covid and was quarantined at the hospital. Mom was released from the hospital less than a week before her passing. My whole family was allowed to be with her at that time. The assisted living staff took precautions but allowed us the privacy to be with her to say goodbye.

This was a time of exquisite pain and boundless blessings. It has been another long chapter adjusting to life "after," but my family has stuck together to support our dad and each other. I continue to be guided by Proverbs 3:5-6. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart. Lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will make your paths straight."
