

Matthew 25:23

From the Gospel lesson for November 19



Can there be any greater hope for any of us than to be in God's presence on that last day and hear our Lord say to us, "Well done!" To know that even in the midst of our many foibles and faults, God would find us trustworthy? Can there be any greater hope than to hear that God is pleased with

how we have managed the blessings with which we have been entrusted?

But can we really be expected to continue trusting God and being faithful in our giving with the economy going down the toilet? Luther Seminary recently sent me an article titled, "Biblical Principles for Surviving Uncertain Times", by Steve Scalici. He states "There are few certainties in life and one of them is that we will have economic uncertainty. As a matter of fact, if you look at history, you will see that not a year goes by that there wasn't something to be worried about ... since 1900 ... (I) can find at least three "scary" events each year that add to that year's uncertainty. There is a lot of fear out there right now which is no different than any time in history. So the question is, how do we respond in difficult economic times?"

Scalici then proceeds to identify five basic Biblical principles that can apply to any economic environment.

- 1. Spend less than you earn
- 2. Avoid the use of debt
- 3. Save money for provisional purpose
- 4. Set long term goals
- 5. Believe that God owns it all

(For the record, I would change the order so that number 5 was first as I believe that it sets the foundation for everything else.)

In the end, none of us can predict what tomorrow will bring, but we can be sure that these principles will put us in a position to survive any economic environment. We have to understand that the world is unstable and none of us is immune from it. Human nature leads us to believe that we are insulated; however, God never promised we would be free from tough times. It is during these times that our faith is stretched and we have to choose between fear and faith. Living in faith does not mean we are free from responsibility, however; we must continue to follow God's principles. The difference is we can do so with the confidence that someone bigger and infinitely wiser is ultimately in control.

Even during times of anxiety, (and especially during times of anxiety,) we are called to be faithful and trustworthy with <u>all</u> that God has given us, however much or little it may seem to be. As people of God we do know that God does own everything and we are to seek nothing more than to be "good and trustworthy." I thank you in advance for your continued faithfulness in supporting Christ's work in and through (and beyond) our family of faith.

In one month...18,888 pounds for food sort rescue! The food rescue program at Hastings Family Service is making a difference. In August, 18,000 pounds of food were rescued from their landfill destination and given to folks in need in Hastings. St. Philip's volunteers have played a major role in this success!

Food comes in from three grocery stores and the food is generally still not expired. Volunteers sort through it and organize it by date to go out. Produce that looks a bit downtrodden and food that is expired is separated and now goes to a local pig farmer who is disposing of it by feeding his pigs. This is a win-win for everyone. Thanks to all who are helping with this effort! It is working more smoothly to have just four volunteers per Monday morning with a lead volunteer to answer questions. Watch for the SignUpGenius in your mailbox if you want to take a spot. It generally takes 1.5- 2 hours. The SignUpGenius email comes out around the 25th of the month.


## 20th Annual Bake and Soup Sale

Help is needed for soup prep the day before the sale on Friday, November 17 at 9 am. Many hands are also needed the day of the sale. Sign-up sheets are available in the narthex.

Four different kinds of soup will be available this year: Ham and Bean, Turkey and Wild Rice (both gluten free), Hamburger Vegetable and Chicken Taco. The soups will again be takeout only. Baked goods, candy, home canning, and fresh produce can be brought to church on Friday, November



17, 9 am-7 pm or by 8:30 am on Saturday, November 18. Please wrap items attractively in clear plastic wrap and label the items. Include in the label important information such as gluten-free, contains nuts or any other food allergies.


#### **Hello!** from Diane Frederick

# Highlights of the 2023 Gathering of the Women of the ELCA



- The "Just Love" theme emphasized that many problems could be eliminated by loving others as Jesus taught. The Gathering focused on the increasing diversity of people in the U.S. and the need for greater empathy and compassion.
- Beginning and ending worship services increased our unity.
- Native Americans spoke of continuing struggles for respect in communities and government.
- Eight young women from countries in Europe, Asia and South America shared their experiences of non-acceptance and other hardships when they came to colleges (some Lutheran) in the Midwest.
- Three Bible studies used Matthew parables addressing Jesus' caring ministry. "Do you see the face of God in everyone you meet?"
- Lutheran World Relief addresses concerns around the world; it is not part of the ELCA. The school bags we send allow children to attend school; this also provides one good meal a day! LRW.org
- ◆ Lutheran Disaster Relief is "the humanitarian response ministry of the ELCA." It helps in disasters and other crises within the U.S. it works with other groups and assists with long term recovery efforts. ELCA.org
- Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service has aided refugees for over 85 years. Part of their work is with the government and needed legislation. LIRS.org
- Katie's Fund is an endowment fund to support women in mission and ministry development. WELCA/Katie.org
- Over 1100 women from around the country attended the Gathering. The St. Paul Area Synod was well represented.

# What are the different prayer ministries at St. Philip's and how are they different?

St. Philip's Lutheran Church has a vital prayer ministry that is active in several ways. First, there is the Prayer Team that meets at 5:30 pm the second Tuesday each month at St. Philip's for devotion and prayers for specific members who have shared prayer concerns. Current members of this team are Jennie Thomas, Vonnie Olson, Geri Holmseth, Barb Jorenby, and Judy Werner. If you have questions or would like to consider joining this group, ask one of these awesome ladies. (Men are welcome, too!)

We also have the St. Philip's Prayer Chain, a group of over fifty members who receive prayer concerns shared with them via email and then pray daily for those on their list. All our Prayer Team members are on the Prayer Chain, but not vice versa. Things shared with the Prayer Team are not shared beyond that group unless permission is given, and matters shared with the Prayer Chain are not to go beyond that group without permission. Our congregational intercessory prayers during Sunday worship is when we lift prayers of concern or thanksgiving in our public worship so that our entire community of faith can pray for those whom we list on our Sunday bulletins (with their permission.)

In addition to these prayer ministries, our Fellowship Ministry Team along with the Prayer Ministry Team and our Staff Ministry Team pray for six different member households each week. The Fellowship Ministry Team mails out cards to let the families or individuals know that they are being prayed for and if there are specific matters for us to lift up to notify us.

Finally, as your pastor, it is a privilege for me to pray with you and for you. When you share something with me, I will always ask what, if anything, I have permission to share and with whom.

#### **Keeping Connected**



We are the **Spence Family**, members of St. Philip's since 1995. Steve, Virginia, Kate and Vicki. We moved to Hastings from Apple Valley in 1991. Virginia was born in Worthington, Minnesota and raised on a farm in the Fulda/Avoca, Minnesota area for many years in southwest Minnesota. Steve was born in Hayward, California and his family moved between California and Wisconsin several times, but landed in Wisconsin and Minnesota in the 70s. Son Tom lives in Tennessee with his family. We are blessed that Kate and Vicki both live in St. Paul, not far away from us. Sisters and brothers live in Minnesota or Idaho.

Steve and I were married at St. Philip's, that is St. Philip the Deacon Lutheran Church in Plymouth, Minnesota, by Pastor Valerie Strand. (One of Virginia's sisters is a member of SPDLC.) It was our pleasure during COVID, to attend online services at the church that married us and also hear the message from the same pastor that married us decades ago! Pastor Valerie is still in our hearts. We would also attend St. Philip's Hastings as well, and occasionally Kviteseid Lutheran from Milan Minnesota where sister-in-law Kris is the Pastor for two churches. It may seem odd, but apparently we've had a connect to St. Philip for a long time so choosing St. Philip's in Hastings was meant to be.

We joined St. Philip's in 1995 after Kate was baptized at Avoca Lutheran in Avoca, Minnesota in 1994 as we wanted to have a local church family. After attending several churches, we chose St. Philip's due to the warm welcome from Jim and Vonnie Olson, and many others. Vicki was baptized at St. Philip's by Pastor Phil Walen and both were confirmed here as well. We have many great memories of Sunday school, working at Apple Fest at Gary and Alice McDougall's apple farm, Ellen's wonderful musicals and choirs. musical (flute) participation, Spaghetti dinners, Lenten soup suppers, Camp Amnicon, Operation Christmas Child, and many more. St. Philip's has always been a place for us to worship together, make good relationships with others, and keep us grounded with a church home and family.



Hello, let me tell you a little bit about the **Stewart Family**! Scott and Tiffany both lived in the New Ulm, Minnesota area growing up. After many years of being friends we started dating our sophomore year of high school, and the rest is history!

So, how did we get here?! In 2002, we graduated high school, and made our way north to the University of Minnesota Duluth. UMD was our college of choice for completely different reasons! Scott heard great things about the engineering program. Tiffany wanted to get the furthest distance from home, that was possible, without leaving the state. Four hours seemed like a great plan! At UMD Scott earned a Bachelor's of Science in Chemical Engineering and Tiffany earned a Bachelor's of Applied Science in Psychology.

In 2006, we graduated from college, Scott started a new career as an engineer in Marshall, Minnesota at ADM, we got married, bought our first home together, and Tiffany started a special education paraprofessional position at the Marshall Middle School.

After a few years we decided we were ready to "grow up" and add more than just dogs to our family; however, God had a different plan for us. It took us over a year to get pregnant and were over the moon ecstatic to welcome this new bundle into our life. But again, God's and our plans weren't the same. In January 2011 at our 20-week ultrasound we found out that the special miracle we hoped and prayed for, for such a long time, was not as healthy as we were hoping for. After tons of medical/genetic testing we learned that our baby had a diaphragmatic hernia and a condition called Wolf-Hirschhorn Syndrome. From January to June, we have never prayed so hard for something good to happen. Many of our prayers consisted of, "please God, let this baby be born alive and let him be able to be baptized." On June 2, 2011, God answered our prayers, Jackson Scott was born living, was placed on Tiffany's chest, and surrounded by family our Pastor, at the time, baptized him. Jackson lived for 35 short minutes.

Our lives were forever changed by this precious little baby. We learned unconditional love in a way that many people will never understand and we learned what is like to have a child to only let them go immediately.

After being told it was okay to expand our family, we welcomed our precious daughter, Madison Helen into our arms on May 10, 2012. She quickly became the apple of our eyes! Madison is now 11 years old and a 6<sup>th</sup> grader at Hastings Middle School. She enjoys being on the Hastings Area Swim Team and running track with the school. She plays the clarinet and takes school extremely seriously!

On February 6, 2014, we added another precious bundle to our lives, Preston Larry. Preston was an extremely hard and vocal baby who had horrible colic but my goodness he sure was adorable when he wasn't crying! Preston is now 9 in 4<sup>th</sup> grade at Kennedy Elementary. He loves the social aspect of school and still continues to make a lot of noise but only because he enjoys making friends! Preston will be starting his first year of Squirt hockey this year, with dad, as an assistant coach. Preston also loves playing any pick-up sports game he can find around the neighborhood. At the end of 2014 big changes were happening for us.
